

Ukraine: Incident Management Training

Responders deployed to deliver incident management training to people living and working close to the front line. The training focussed on trauma medicine and included the sharing of lifesaving medical skills.



Response headlines:

- 6 Responders deployed.
- 111 Ukrainians trained in lifesaving medical techniques.
- Medical supplies worth £2000 left with local groups and individuals.
- Training sessions delivered in Mykolaiv, Nikopol and Marhanets.
- Worked with local organisations Ukrainian Education Platform and Globa22.
- Training locations included a secure underground bunker.
